This tool is awesome! It seems that when I compare taco and burrito, tacos are much more popular in literature. There is a slight spike back around 1812 to around 1823 then very little activity until early 1900's followed by the steady increase in the 1930's-1940's. From this one might conclude that the words are used in a different way than they had been used previously. My speculation is that because of advertising, the two words show up more in written literature
